IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

Fluzone Intradermal Quadrivalent vaccine should not be administered to anyone with a severe allergic reaction (eg, anaphylaxis) to any vaccine component, including eggs, egg products, or to a previous dose of any influenza vaccine.

Tell the doctor if you have ever experienced Guillain-Barré syndrome (severe muscle weakness) after a previous dose of influenza vaccine. If you notice any other problems or symptoms following vaccination, please contact your health care professional immediately.

Side effects to Fluzone Intradermal Quadrivalent vaccine include itching, redness, swelling, and firmness at the injection site. Such reactions have occurred more frequently with vaccine administered into the skin compared to vaccine administered into the muscle. Other common side effects to Fluzone Intradermal Quadrivalent vaccine include pain at the injection site; muscle aches, headache, fatigue, and shivering. Other side effects may occur. Vaccination with Fluzone Intradermal Quadrivalent vaccine may not protect all individuals.

INDICATION

Fluzone Intradermal Quadrivalent vaccine is given to people 18 through 64 years of age to help prevent influenza disease caused by influenza A and B strains contained in the vaccine.
